### Meet our first Research Stars – Joy and Jackie

Congratulations to Research Nurse Joy Dearden, our very first Research Star of the Month. Joy was chosen as January's Star for the way she has contributed to the success of the team delivering to critical care trials, and especially the BRAVO study.

This is a complex and demanding trial which requires dedication and commitment to recruit patients and often involves challenging and emotional discussions with families. Joy went above and beyond her day to day duties, working flexibly and coming into work on her days off to help with both the recruitment and subsequent sampling for the two patients recruited in January. She also led some training for the other team members.

Well done, too, to Jackie Evans, who has been chosen as February's Research Star for her great work recruiting the first patient at Salford Royal to the 100,000 Genomes Project. Jackie signed up a kidney patient within 48 hours of the project going live here – and let us use [her photo](#) to help publicise it!

Patients with rare diseases and their families, as well as patients with cancer, are being invited to take part in the nationwide project by giving samples of their DNA. Salford Royal is particularly interested in people with rare kidney problems and also those with brain tumours as these are areas of clinical expertise in Salford.

The Research Star of the Month award has been introduced to recognise the way many of our staff go the extra mile to make a significant contribution to research and patient care within research.

A small committee will assess nominations each month and the winner will receive a certificate as well as having their work recognised through articles in this Bulletin and on social media. We'll also be having a photo display of winners.

We welcome nominations from all staff and about all staff – this award is not limited to any particular staff group and is about contribution, not job title! Nominations will close on the last day of each month with the winner chosen the first week of the next month. Decisions will be made by a team which will include, where possible, the previous month's winner.

[Renal research staff hit target for transplant and dialysis studies](#)

Congratulations to all the renal research staff involved in the OuTSMART study, which has now reached its national recruitment target of 2,094.

Staff at Salford Royal recruited 52 patients to the National Institute for Health Research-funded study to test whether a structured screening programme to identify patients with a biomarker for kidney transplant failure, along with an immunosuppression treatment protocol, can reduce transplant failure rates. Their dedication and hard work helped to make sure recruitment was completed on schedule.

The study is being run from the MRC Centre for Transplantation at King's College, London and is due to complete in 2020.

Also well done to those involved in the MODEST project, exploring how best to identify depression in non English speaking dialysis patients from South Asian backgrounds. Research Nurse Lilian Hlongwane and Project Worker Yasmin Zia screened and recruited 24 patients through the Oldham and Rochdale dialysis units and the team also recruited 13 patients from Salford Royal to the control group. This was a major contribution to the overall recruitment across nine NHS sites. Again, the study is funded by the National Institute for Health Research.

### Share your views on key issues in trauma

The National Institute for Health Research, in partnership with key stakeholders, is holding a workshop in summer 2017 to develop key priorities for future research in trauma. Before that, it wants health professionals to help identify the key research uncertainties, questions or themes.

## Engagement

### Intracerebral Haemorrhage (ICH) Stroke – responding to patient experience

Salford R+D's Engagement and Communications team has supported Adrian Parry-Jones and the team working on intracerebral haemorrhage (ICH) stroke by involving patients in a number of pieces of work as well as assisting with applications for new funding.

Patients have talked about their experience of this devastating event and how it has impacted on their lives – not just while they were in hospital, but in the months and years following. Listening to and

understanding patients' experiences allows us to make changes to the way we deliver services and care for our patients, and often simple things have a big impact. Following the most recent meeting, specialist ICH nurse Emily Birleson is reviewing the information given to patients and their carers post-stroke.

Adrian and his team have been awarded £75,000 from independent health charity the Health Foundation, which will fund a project aiming to reduce the percentage of patients dying or left severely disabled six months after experiencing intracerebral haemorrhage. Involving patients in the way this project is structured and delivered not only improves patient experiences, but also helps to make sure that the research is deliverable and that participants are kept involved throughout the life of the project.

### World Kidney Day a big success

Staff, patients, charities and supporters from Salford Royal's renal department united to raise awareness of key issues around kidney health and conditions on World Kidney Day, 9 March.

They arranged a day of activities and stalls in Hope Building where visitors and staff could find out more about some of the many projects being carried out to improve patients' care and their experience of treatment, including quality improvement initiatives, research, complementary therapies and peer support programmes.

They also had a 'social media takeover' of the Trust's website, Facebook page and Twitter feed and used the occasion to launch the Renal Department's own [Facebook page](#).

Vascular Research Team Manager Christina Summersgill and colleagues highlighted some of the many studies available to kidney patients – including the [100,000 Genomes Project](#) and the [PEDAL study](#) into exercise for dialysis patients. The day also saw publicity for Salford Royal's new links with [colleagues in Nigeria](#) in a prestigious programme of education and research run by the International Society of Nephrology.

### New standards for public involvement

The National Institute for Health Research is working with partner organisations in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland to draw up national standards for public involvement in research. The project aims to improve the quality and consistency of public involvement in research and the draft standards will be published for review by potential users this summer. ## Training

### Trauma symposium

The Greater Manchester Academic Centre for Acute Tissue Injury and Trauma (GM-CAT) is collaborating with the University of Salford and MAHSC for the [North West Trauma Symposium](#) on 4 May, at MediaCity, Salford. Consultants Professor Paul Dark and Professor Fiona Lecky from Salford Royal are among the speakers, alongside Professor Tony Freemont from The University of Manchester and Dr Antoinette Edwards from the Trauma Audit and Research Network.

The symposium will also showcase preliminary findings from the ongoing Trauma Biomarker Project (UKCRN 19377), a multi-centre NIHR-Portfolio study led by the University of Salford in collaboration with the Central Manchester and Salford Royal Foundation Trusts.

### Translational gene therapy workshop

The Manchester Regenerative Medicine Network, in collaboration with Dr Brian Bigger, will be holding a workshop focusing on translational gene therapy. It will be an introduction to the essential considerations facilitating the movement of basic gene therapy research into clinical trial. The workshop will cover selection of clinically approved vectors, GMP vector production and transduction, regulation of ATMP clinical trials, and commercialisation considerations. Speakers from MHRA, Syncona Partners and The Cell and Gene Therapy Catapult as well clinical and academic gene therapy researchers from The University of Manchester will share their knowledge.
